


You may or may not know but your Commodore is currently

The job of the past commodore is quite specific as I am required to speak up at board meetings with pithy comments like, “In my day we did it this way” and generally provide continuity from one regime to another.







Potluck – 6:00 PM Sat – Bring a casserole, salad, or dessert to share, and your own utensils, dishes and drinks.






And, then there were just two: Long Point Challenge, June 22-23

At 10:30 Saturday, June 22, five boats: *Happy Puppy*, *Ain't Miss Behavin*, *Synergy*, and *Jeannie* from CBYC and *Spankin' Mad* from BQYC set off on the 107 nm Long Point Challenge. This race takes boats out into the lake, either through the Lower or Upper Gap, to round the weather buoy, ODAS 45012, directly south of Wellington on the Canada/US border. The full fleet opted for the Lower Gap route, which seemed like a good choice for the first 3 nm. As we made our way out through the gap the wind dropped. *Happy Puppy* went east towards Wolfe Island, the wrong way by the chart, but a good move for wind. *Synergy* went west along the south shore of Amherst Island; also a good route for wind. The rest of us kept heading south into a big wind hole, from which we observed *Happy Puppy* trucking west along the south horizon and *Synergy* making progress west against the backdrop of Amherst Island.



Eventually the wind picked up to a raging 5 knots and we began to move. As the sun began to set and the mist built, *Jeannie*, *Synergy*, and *Ain't Miss Behavin* met up as they worked their way around the False Ducks and on towards the turning mark. *Happy Puppy*, well ahead, rounded at about midnight with *Ain't Miss Behavin* second, but almost 2 hours behind. We on *Jeannie* met her as she spookily emerged from the mist just before we made the mark. *Synergy* followed around a short while later and *Spankin' Mad* trailed.

Getting to the weather buoy had been frustrating, but the return was to be worse. With essentially no wind the *Stomoxys Calcitrans* (biting house-flies) found the boats and began to feast on the crews. On *Jeannie* we took turns at the wheel – one hand for steering and the other for fly swatting – as tried to keep on course in the heavy mist. Dawn help reduce the mist, but did not bring wind nor get rid of the flies. The cockpit of *Jeannie* started to fill with dead flies and crew blood.

Progress was painfully slow as the crews baked to a fine red and the skippers of *Ain't Miss Behavin*, *Synergy*, and *Spankin' Mad*, to avoid mutinies, withdrew from the race. The brave (crazy) crews of *Happy Puppy* and *Jeannie* pressed on; alternately finding 3-5 knot breezes and massive holes of no wind. *Jeannie* did a bit better than *Happy Puppy* at finding what little wind there was and managed to reduce the lead to about 1h. *Happy Puppy* finished at 16:24 on Sunday with *Jeannie* coming home just under an hour later. After 30 plus hours of drifting the corrected times for the race showed *Happy Puppy* the winner by 1 minute and 31 seconds!

Lesson Learned – Read and Remember the SIs (Sailing Instructions)

On Thursday, July 4, precisely at 6:00 pm the CBYC Race Committee raised the red class flag to start the usual 5 minutes of mad jockeying for best position on the start line. As *Jeannie* fought it out with the other members of the spinnaker fleet the white sail boats kept getting in our way. With a bit of colourful language I expressed my frustration at *Horizon Dancer* blocking my progress. Why don't they wait outside the start area until their start? Finally through all the confusion *Investors Group*, *Synergy*, *The Baron*, and *Jeannie* hit the line as the start horn went. We on *Jeannie* noted the over-early signal, but it could not be for us. We were definitely behind the line at the start. But, so were the other boats in our fleet it seemed – strange! So, on we all went battling around the marks. *Investors Group* was first back to the finish line, but no finish signal! Next was *Jeannie*, and we did not get a finish signal either. Is the Race Committee asleep?



And they're off, Jeannie, July 18

As *Synergy* and *The Baron* finished, also with no signals, I replayed the start in my mind. The RED class flag went up, and But our class flag is YELLOW! As we came to the realization that we had taken the white sail start, *Mango*, the last of the spinnaker fleet, crossed the finish line to get a signal. *Mango*, being late on the start, correctly read the over-early signals; returned to the start area and took her correct spinnaker fleet start 6 minutes later. Nice to see that at least one skipper was awake!

Okay – I have learned my lesson – read and note the SIs. My only consolation is that the skippers of *The Baron*, *Synergy*, and *Investors Group* were as negligent as I. Apologies to *Horizon Dancer* – *Jeannie* was interfering with your start and not the reverse.

R-Class boats in full flight

As part of their 75th anniversary celebrations PEYC took on the task of hosting the 2013 edition of the EYC Regatta, July 11 – 13. Many club members pitched in to bring off a great event with well-organized racing, good food and fun social time. Two boats from CBYC participated in the racing: *Jeannie* in the Division 1 spinnaker group and *Horizon Dancer* in NFS1.

The delivery trip on Wednesday, July 10 certainly contradicted the old adage that "getting there is half the fun". From 11:00 to 18:00, *Jeannie* fought 20 plus knot winds on the nose all the way from the mouth of Collins Bay to Picton. At one point the wind meter reported 30 knots! In tandem, regular *Jeannie* crew, Larry Graham, single handed his boat, *Oriana* down to PEYC so we would have a place to sleep in luxury. *Horizon Dancer* motored to Picton later in the day through similar winds.

The distance race on Thursday began in very light and shifty winds, which made for tricky sailing, particularly at the two crossings of the Glenora ferry track. Fortunately when *Jeannie* and the other lead boats were left bobbing in a lull the good ferry captain made a wide detour around us. *Horizon Dancer* did an excellent job of catching the wind shifts and finished first in her division. Congratulations to skipper Glen Reid and crew!

The round-the-marks racing on Friday and Saturday, with an approxi-

mately north-south course from the mouth of Picton Bay into Long Reach, was exciting. The steep cliffs to the west and multiple points of land made for tricky breezes. Doing well was a matter of reading and reacting to the shifts. On Sunday, at the bottom of the course near the mouth of Picton bay we had an approximately 180 degree change in wind. There were some tense moments as the south heading boats doused their spinnakers and raised Genoas while the NFS fleet passed through the confusion on their way north to the windward mark.

Again this year with 14 boats the Bay of Quinte Yacht Club had by far the largest number of entries at EYC. With 8 of these boats in the white sail division, BQYC is helping to bring back the tradition of EYC as a regatta for families with cruising sailboats. I would like to encourage the cruisers at CBYC to consider putting a trip to EYC on their sailing agenda for next season. You will experience a fun event and may, as we did this year, get a chance for a close-up view of the beautiful R-class boats in action as you round the marks together.

Congratulations and thank you to PEYC for a fun regatta.

Who is visiting Collins Bay?



CBYC – Big Kids Summer Camp for Cruisers U.S. Cruise 11-19 July 2013

Six boats took part: Day Dreams, Dream Haze , Moonshadow, Rus II, Second Wind and Beluga V. With one exception, they were the same boats that went on the cruise last year. "This is beginning to look a little cliquey", remarked Captain Dave, as we all crammed ourselves onto his boat for a skipper's meeting at anchor opposite Waupoos Marina: "We need some new blood." After a few drinks and nibbles, three important decisions had been made: we'd each have a buddy boat to look out for each other on the crossing; we'd try to do without food at happy hours with an eye to keeping our waistlines; and that we'd all be up really early the next morning in time for a 6 am start across the lake to Sodus Bay.



Later that evening, the heavens succeeded in impressing us with a full blown rainbow, every stripe brilliantly delineated and its reflection perfectly outlined in the water. A good omen for our 10 hour crossing the next day – we hoped. Well at least it didn't rain. With the wind on the stern quarter, it was not the most comfortable of passages, but by 4.45pm we were all safely docked at the Sodus Bay Yacht club and looking forward to the dinner that had been arranged for us in the dining room. A convivial gathering indeed and one that set the tone for all the coming days. Collins Bay Yacht Club and its Marina are well thought of by our American hosts, many of whom had visited us and were keen to show us the same hospitality and friendliness that they had ex-

perienced at CB. Thanks to Dave Sansom's organising abilities we were expected and guided into visitors' docks at each location we visited along the south shore.

At Sodus Bay we signed in at the U.S. customs phone, watched dozens of kids participating in the sailing school, ate at the yacht club the first night and shared a picnic table with our own food the second. Some walked up to the lighthouse museum, some walked to the chandlery, the ice cream shop and the village green where a re-enactment of the Sodus Bay battle of 1812 was taking place throughout the day, and some just



walked. As we were about to leave on the third day, the buddy system came into its own when Beluga had problems with reverse gear. Second Wind stayed behind to help, with the other boats staying in radio contact. Geoff and Jim each disappeared into Beluga's voluminous cockpit lockers and eventually emerged grubby and hot, but victorious having diagnosed the problem and effected a temporary fix.

Pultneyville, just 12 nm away to the west, with its idyllic setting, wide lawns set under huge shady trees, and not to mention really awesome wash-rooms, was the perfect antidote to any kind of stress. It was here that we were initiated into the mysteries of geocaching by the crew of Moonshadow which had nearly everyone out following clues and cross




examining the oldest inhabitant (97) of Pultneyville, as he and his wife sat on their verandah. A lot was learned about the history of the town but was the treasure ever uncached? We never really did find out. At night we listened to jazz while we ate at the new grill a few minutes walk from the yacht club and visited the art gallery attached to it. In the morning we watched swans and cygnets glide by on the water and attempted to swim off the rocky beach, difficult unless you had brought fins and snorkel gear. Our hosts encouraged us to use the kitchen in the clubhouse, and to take lettuce from the little garden plot outside in exchange for a bit of weeding. We enjoyed the large verandah overlooking the water and took full advantage of several rocking chairs. That, and the hot weather made for easy conversation, opportunities to read and swap books, and not a few comparisons as to future lives at old folks' homes.

We really hated to leave this place, but after our allotted two days, leave we must for Little Sodus, or FairHaven as it is most often called. Here were great finds: a pump out for \$5 at Anchor Marine; diesel fill up and the friendly offer to stay to do laundry or take a shower at Fair Port Marine; a short dinghy ride across the bay into town to a really good grocery store which made their own bread and sold a great diversity of things even down to disinfectant for boat toilets; a liquor store where Dutch raspberry





chocolate red wine could be purchased - and was later generously shared after another picnic supper; the Fly By Night Cookie Company housed in premises resembling Grimm's Gingerbread House and offering 65 varieties of home baked cookies. Lots to do here, and the culmination was the offer by Moonshadow to take us all across the bay to the hotel on our last evening. After supper and much chat, we paused in the garden to swing and admire the flowers and the sunset before sailing back to the yacht club dock on this beautiful boat.

Once again it was hard to leave, but the Friday night fish fry at Henderson Harbour beckoned. Quite a long haul to Henderson and tricky getting in, but managed seamlessly through teamwork and Chuck, the dock master, who then proceeded to lead us all like eager ducklings, around the clubhouse to be told where to place garbage, what was on offer on the BBQ, where the drinking water was located, Wi Fi password, etc.


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Our bulk e-mailings to CBYC members now contain a URL link back to relevant information on the club website rather than attached files providing details on events. This should help keep your e-mailboxes a bit less full and will always provide you with the most up-to-date information.

The details for any CBYC event can always be obtained via the calendar on the club website. Hovering over the entry for any event, such as the July 27 Dock Sale in the image above, brings up an outline of the related details page. Clicking on the event calendar entry takes you directly to the information page. We will update event information pages as dates approach and new details are in place. So, remember to check back regularly as an event approaches.

POT LUCK RECIPE

Skillet Dessert with Berries

2/3 cup All Purpose flour
 1/4 cup sugar
 1/4 tsp salt
 2 eggs
 1 cup milk
 1/2 tsp vanilla (optional)
 1 tsp oil
 2 tbl fine or icing sugar
 2 cup berries or sliced fruit

Heat a cast iron or heavy frying pan (9-10") over med heat

Combine flour, sugar & salt. Add eggs, milk & vanilla, whisk until smooth

Skillet is hot enough when drop of water dances on surface. Brush skillet with oil. Reduce heat to low, pour batter into skillet, cover and cook for about 10 min. Top should be firm and puffy, bottom golden brown.

Loosen carefully from pan and slide to serving plate. Sprinkle with fine or icing sugar and top with fruit
