The 2016 season was an amazing season for boating, the best we have seen. The weather was sunny and hot with great winds all summer. The marina had a significant increase in transient boaters of over 270 transients which is about 120 more than the last few years, which resulted in 120 reciprocal boaters this year. We saw people from all over the Great Lakes!

The reciprocal program worked well, with most remembering to sign out when they left the dock, allowing us to welcome visiting boaters. We only received a couple of complaints when visiting boaters were not on our reciprocal list.

The marina celebrated its 45th anniversary and our 5th anniversary this summer, with a pig roast and dance along with a spectacular lightning storm! We had a wonderful time celebrating this milestone with all of you and look forward to future celebrations!



This fall we have tried something new to shelter and protect the boats on the hard from the high winds. The crew have installed a makeshift break wall using barges, which will be removed come spring (see photo).

The crew will again be working on repairing the docks over the winter, as this is an ongoing project.

We introduced boat detailing-cleaning and waxing and pressure washing services this fall. This was a great success in part be-

cause of the excellent service provided by Bill Amirault (Aslan). Bill has been a wonderful addition to our crew.

The marina is continuing its fight against the airport expansion. Our next step will be to go to the Ontario Municipal Board (OMB). We are still working hard to protect our naturally-sheltered harbor and great marina! We thank you all for your support. It means a lot to us.

The marina continues to work in unison with the yacht club to promote the club and advertise and promote the events - cruises, bbq's, races etc., which in turn helps to promote the marina. Sailing School

As those of you who attended the AGM will know, sailing school enrollment has been on a downward spiral for several years, and this year we had the lowest number of registrations in almost a decade. We managed to break even for the year by deferring necessary fleet improvements, but this is only a temporary reprieve. We need to develop a strategy to reverse the trend. To that end, it was decided at the AGM to stand up a committee to investigate ways to increase enrollment. Speaking of enrollment, anyone planning to enroll a child in an organized fitness program for the first time in 2017 should be aware that the \$500 federal children's fitness tax credit is being eliminated after 2016. If your child is was not enrolled in an eligible program in 2016, you may still be able to take advantage of this tax credit for an eligible program in 2017, as long as the registration fee is paid before the end of December. If anyone would like to apply this to sailing school registration for summer 2017 please contact me.

The evening begins at 7:00PM with instruction from said sailor/curlers and from then we will proceed to make up some teams for a game. The cost per curler would be \$15.


The location is The Royal Kingston Curling Club at 130 Days Road (east side almost to Front Road) the same location for our Annual General Meetings.

Updates on KSL's transition to their new location will be provided as they become available.




What Happens to our Retired Sails?
