
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

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A Note from the Vice Commodore:

Junior Sailing Program

We have talked briefly about the possibility of C.B.Y.C. running a junior sailing program in Collins Bay but we have not, as yet, discussed possible school formats nor the level of financial investment which such a program would require.

I hope to present here a brief description of a typical "middle of the road" training program which I personally would like to see operating in Collins Bay. Such a program would be operating at the yacht club from Monday to Friday, typically from 9.00 am to 4.00 pm with a possible spin-off to evening adult courses.

First, a basic question. What are the aims of the program?

- (I) To develop a healthy, independent and active interest in safe and skillful recreational and competetive sail boat racing.
- (II) To foster a camaraderie and spirit which is necessary for the growth of a club and a community.
- (III) To encourage inter club sailboat racing in an air of friendly rivalry.

Another important question. What would be the cost of running such a program?

The costs which I present here are typical for Ontario sailing schools. Some are higher, not many are lower.

Assume a 10 week program with each session being 2 weeks long (10 days) with maybe a 1 day end of course activity.

With a 3 dinghy training fleet, 3 pupils per boat we would be looking for a minimum of 9 pupils per session i.e. 45 pupils over the 10 week period.

If the cost per session is \$150 Income is $\frac{6750}{}$

To be in line with other clubs, C.Y.A., O.S.A. financial aid requirements and in the interests of safe operation, insurance etc. we should operate with C.Y.A. qualified instructors with courses to C.Y.A. level qualification requirements (White sail, Blue, Bronze, Silver, Gold)

With two instructors:
One head instructor, \$200 per week.
One assistant instructor \$100 per week.
Expenditure \$3000

The balance of the annual income would go on training aids, manuals, boat up keep and insurance.

Any unused balance would go toward repayment of interest free boat loans. More about this in the next newsletter.

I suggested earlier that we should look at a minimum of 45 students to operate a program over the summer.

With our present membership the maximum number of junior members which we could expect is 26 (130% participation). This means that we would be looking outside of the club for additional juniors, which is normal for any yacht club junior school and is basically subsidisation.

The Ontario Sailing Association, who loan boat purchase money, suggest that we spend this summer



and the fall canvassing the local clubs for junior program operating experience with a view to starting our own program next summer. This gives us time to plan the program, arrange boat purchase and arrange fund raising activities.

I will present more information on training boat types, financial costs and possible fund raising activities in the next newsletter.

The above suggestions and thoughts are my own, at the moment, and are not necessarily those of the club executive.

I would very much appreciate a show of interest from the members in the form of suggestions and constructive criticism.

I would like to thank George Hammond for collecting much of the Junior program information.

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GORDON ISLAND CRUISE
