



C.Y.A. Basic Boating Certification

Any club member who wishes to apply for C.Y.A. Basic Cruising Certification should contact Dave Sewell, 542-9014.

The certification levels include Basic, Intermediate, and Advanced (off-shore). For Basic, one needs to know basic sail and boat handling, rules of the road, safety procedures (man overboard) etc. etc.

Certification requires success in two parts, a written multiple choice exam of 1 1/2 - 3 hours, and an on-the-water practical demonstration of your skills requiring 1 1/2 - 2 hours of time.

While as many as want could write the written portion, only three or four people could complete the practical in a day.

Participants must pay a registration fee and cost-share in the examiners time.

When one considers that the week long course from a professional Sailing School offering C.Y.A. certification costs anywhere from \$300 - \$500 for the four day program, this method of cost sharing the examiner's time is a real bargain for those who feel they already qualify on the basis of practical experience and some Canadian Power and Sail Squardon courses.

Let me know ASAP if you are interested so we can nail down the examiner's time.

1987 WOMEN'S KEELBOAT COURSE

For women members of C.B.Y.C. (others as space permits) who have or who can access a fixed keel or centreboard cruising capable boat 2'-24' and up.

PURPOSE:

To improve the sailing and cruising capabilities of women members of CBYC.

PHASES:

In 1987, the course is divided into Parts I and II. Part I is for those who did not participate in the 1986 course and for those who wish a refresher. Part II is a week-end cruise which would involve Part I "graduates", those who are judged to be equivalent and those who completed Part I in 1986.

- Part I Two evening dry land sessions.
 - Two evening on the water sailing sessions. Crews of three or four with instructor.
- Part II Weekend sailing program/cruise.
 - Each boat one experienced woman sailor, one instructor, and three crew.
 - Friday night leave for Cedar Island.
 - Tie up sleep aboard, or camp.
 - Saturday, Dry land sailing instructor A.M.
 - Saturday P.M. Sail. Skippers, crew, instructors change about.
 - Saturday evening Dry land Navigation.
 - Sunday A.M. Dry land/sail, etc.
 - Sunday noon Leave and return to CBYC.

MEALS

Each crew of four (4) would provide one meal for their crew from their repertoire of most successful cruising meals. Recipes must be available to share with others.

SPLICE THE MAINBRACE

As with meals, particularly successful "yardarmers" would be shared amongst participants, including recipes.

EVENINGS

Participants should be prepared for dry land sessions or night navigation both Friday and Saturday evenings.

DATES

Part I - Dry land sessions

- Wednesdays, May 20th and 27th.

- On the water sailing sessions

- Wednesdays, June 3rd and 10th.

Part II - Weekend Cruise - June 20 and 21.

BOATS

Part I - Crews will share boats. Rotation of crews through position of skipper and crew will give everyone a chance to experience various sailing responsibilities. Part II - One boat for the weekend will be required for each four (4) participants.

FEE

The club would like us to charge a small fee for this extraordinary fine program of skill, confidence and knowledge building initiated by a marvelous bunch of fabulous instructors. Therefore, the following fee structure has been initiated, payable at the time of registration. (Cheques made payable to Collins Bay Yacht Club).

OFFICER OF THE DAY

DUTIES INCLUDE:

- For one day of the season from June 30 to Sept 4, from 9:00 AM to 9:00 PM, assuming the responsibilities of Officer of the Day.
- Being on-site for most of that day if at all possible, particularly between the hours of 3:00 PM to 7:00 PM when most arrivals occur. It's a great day to get work done on the boat, to otherwise putter, to sit and dream dreams.
- If not at the Club, leaving your telephone number prominently displayed, so that you can be reached by telephone, and being prepared to drop down to the Club as soon as you receive a call.
- When on-site, displaying the Officer of the Watch flag at the shore end of the dock on which your boat is located so that people seeking you do not need to wander the whole marina looking for you.
- Keeping track of which slips (of club members) are available and for how long, and leaving this information in some sort of order for your replacement the next day.
- Being on-site in the morning of your Officer of the Watch day around departure times, to get first hand information from departing club members as to which slip they are vacating and for how long.
- Recording that information and passing it on.
- Ensuring that new arrivals from clubs with a CBYC reciprocal agreement get a CBYC slip for their first night.
- Reporting their arrival to Hub, Bill or Mary Steenbakker.
- Helping new arrivals with whatever their informational needs are - food, laundry, showers, transportation, events, etc.
- If you find that you cannot make it on your day, making sure that you have arranged to switch with someone willing to replace you.

As you can see, the task is not very onerous. It entails being around, being available, and being helpful, three generally pleasant tasks.
