

SAFETY SAFETY SAFETY

Safety Tips:

- 1. Make sure you boat meets D.O.T. safety equipment standards.
- 2. Check fuel lines for leaks.
- 3. Check stove linkages for leaks.
- Have extinguishers on board. Have them checked.
- 5. Double check all standing and running rigging.
- 6. Keep a supply of spares on board.
- 7. Check through hull fittings before launch.
- Have a VHF radio on board, learn how to use it, get a radio operators license (its easy) and check the radio reception with UDQ Cardinal.
- 9. Always monitor Channel 16 when under way.
- 10. Have one life jacket for each person on board.
- 11. Have at least one long length of extra heavy line on board for emergencies (yours or someone elses).
- 12. Keep a first aid kit permanently on board, know what is in it, know how to use it, and replenish it after every use.
- 13. Get certified in CPR, mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, sunstroke, hypothermia.
- 14. Establish and practice a man-over-board drill.
- 15. Control the use of alcohol while underway or before heading out.

- 16. Avoid taking unnecessary chances. Practice caution. Develop a mode of thinking which is always anticipatory. Stay alert. Be prepared for what could happen next.
- 17. Learn to read charts. Use them. Have the charts on board for waters into which you intend to sail.
- 18. Phone the weather office (389-2352) before leaving home. Listen to channel 83A for the Mayfor and Synopses before leaving the dock. Learn how to translate the Mayfor (its easy). Know that the pattern of weather suggested by the Mayfor is usually very accurate. Sometimes the timing is off; that is, the pattern may move through your area sooner or later than is suggested by the Mayfor. However, if the pattern suggests Rain and High Winds, you can pretty well bet you are going to get them. Maybe that is not the time to steam out into the middle of the Lake. Watch the sky. Look for banks of dark black clouds. When you see them coming find a safe anchorage or batten down the hatches, she's going to blow.

I-68 FORMS

If you own a boat less than 30 ft. long and under 5 tons displacement, you may wish to obtain an I-68 form.

With this form you may visit any U.S. port on the Great Lakes for a period of 72 hours, without having to report to U.S. Customs. You don't have to own a boat to acquire an I-38 form, and your passengers or crew may appreciate you picking them up one.

WE NEED A COMMITTEE BOAT!!!

We are still looking for people to act as the committee boat for the Thursday night races.

What's involved? Not much and your efforts will be VERY much appreciated.

Here is a quick description of the committee boat responsibilities:

- Arrive at the Marina about 5.30 p.m. and make sure that wind and weather permitting, there is a race.
- 2. Steam out and drop anchor at the mouth of Collins Bay.
- 3. Races start at 600 p.m. At 10 min. to 6.00 one blast is sounded on the air horn (which is provided). Another blast sounds 5 minutes later and again at 6.00. This final blast is the start of the race. During the 10 min prior to the start, record numbers on the boats participating.
- Make note of any boat or boats that cross the line before the last blast.
- Record the exact time the race starts.
- 6. Enjoy the pleasant summer evening on Lake Ontario.
- 7. Record the time as each boat crosses the finish line.

DRINKING AND DRIVING

You should treat your boat as you would your own automobile. The rules of the road apply to the rules of the Waterways.

If you have a boat with a head, galley, and sleeping accommodation, its considered a home, but when its moving it's considered a vehicle. There is no law against drinking in your home, so when your stationary you can drink. When under sail or motor all persons on board must refrain from alcoholic beverages or risk losing your right to boat.

My suggestion! Don't be that someone. Use the drinking and driving law as an excellent guide to your alcohol related behaviour on the water.
