## Commodore's Message

Well the end of the season is here and a fine one it was. The weather was good and the sailing fine.

The club hosted several cruising events which were enjoyed by the participants. There seems to be a modest decline in interest in organized cruising but I feel it is important to maintain this activity.

At the same time, we have seen a significant increase in racing. Both the number of participants and the quality of racing has improved. Many skippers are beginning to see racing as an activity that is both enjoyable and a means of honing skills.

Despite some growing pains, we operated a very successful Sail Training Program again this year. The Program was also financially successful as we have been able to make the final payment on the bank loan that we took out to purchase the fleet.

I am particularly pleased with the response of the membership to our proposed clubhouse. We have received a positive response from a large majority of the members and are now a good financial position to proceed with construction. There has been some delays starting for a variety of reasons, not the least of which is that the original plan to use the steel pipes for flotation has had to be abandoned because there is insufficient flotation. Current plans call for a series of plastic drums to be used as flotation. This will not only provide the additional flotation, but will also be safer since the flotation is by its very nature modular. Hub expects to complete work on the platform this fall. While we may get some construction done this fall, we expect the bulk of the work will be done in the early spring.

It is not possible to list all the individuals that have worked so hard to make this a special club but I want to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to all the wonderful people who have contributed so generously of their time and efforts. With this kind of enthusiasm

and devotion, I am sure next year will be something to look forward to.

The following is a summary of our financial status to October 23,1991. A full financial report will be prepared at our fiscal year end, December 31. 1991.



The Adams attended most of the cruises one way or another and the Cruising Trophy will again go to Trinco III.


For next year we have to get some new blood into the Cruise Committee. If you have some ideas or are willing to organize a cruise, please call the Cruise Chair next year.
