

MALCOLM STOTT TIGHTENS GRIP ON MAIN DUCK RACE/CRUISE WITH 2ND YEAR WIN!!

In the best tradition of long distance racing, with race day and start time officially established, and race committee approval, boats may depart any time thereafter, until the final cutoff date. By 10:00 a.m., Saturday, July 18, only three boats could make the official start. A self timed race, first across the line was John Sealy (Magic Karpet) followed closely by Malcolm Stott (Simmac). David Sewell (Morning Mist), with experienced crew, Richard Sealy (borrowed from Magic Karpet) made the start at 1100, having sailed up from Admiralty Bay. Rosaire Rheume (Apres Ski III), a late entry, who had some last minute provisioning to complete for a longer voyage after the race/cruise, took his start time shortly before noon. Doug Wagner (Alpine Star) got a jump on the competition with an early morning start. Therefore, while he was part of the cruise, he had eliminated himself from Leg I of the race.

The weather was partly cloudy with variable winds 5 to 10, shifting between WSW and SW. Haze on the Lake reduced visibility to about 3 miles. Seas ran at about one meter. While still in the lee of Amherst Island, it looked like an easy reach to the Island, as the wind appeared to be almost due West. It was not difficult to make a heading of 210 M. It became obvious that the eye of the wind was Main Duck itself, once we were clear of Amherst Island.

At the skippers meeting, the course to the Island had been made more direct. Now, it was only necessary to keep K9 and Pigeon Island to Port. Portions eliminated included the usual legs that carry racers around Salmon Island, before reaching K9.

The sail to Main Duck was very eventful! While stalled in the hole at the eastern most tip of Amherst, Richard, the crew of Morning Mist, studying the bird life through binoculars, discovered a pelican sitting amongst the cormorants in the shallows of the reef that connects Amherst to the Brothers! The other event of major significance was the Mayday that occurred in the early afternoon. Apparently a diver had succumbed while investigating wrecks off the SE corner of Amherst, in waters over ten fathoms.

The winds picked up slightly for a brief period in the afternoon but shifted towards the south and dropped steadily from about 1500 on. By 1700 with speeds of less than two knots, and with between 3 and 4 miles still to go, two boats withdrew, registering a **DNF** on the first leg. To add, insult to injury, one boat had to be towed the last few hundred yards into port because fuel supplies had not been checked prior to departure. Oh the shame of it! But enough said. Let us look at how things turned out.

First across the line was Magic Karpet followed by Simmac and then much later Apres Ski (DNF) and Morning Mist (DDNF). Magic Karpet had the day on adjusted time, but not by much. Much would depend on Leg II, the down wind journey home.

The solidarity between non-such owners was demonstrated in Schoolhouse Bay that evening. Upon arrival, the crew of Apres Ski were immediately treated to a sumptuous meal by Bruce and Alda Fairbairn (Pyewacket), while the rest of us fended for ourselves, simply on the basis of both owning the same kind of boat! Pyewacket was on a return voyage from an extended survey of Southern Shores (of the Lake).

With six boats in from CBYC, Schoolhouse Bay was a busy place. People rafted to shore any way they could. The real salts anchored-off. The center of attention was John Sleay's gang plank which got increasingly interesting as people took care, medicinal, of their need to restore bodies dehydrated by sun and wind.



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Sunday, July 19 was beautiful! Winds were less than 5 knots out of the SW. Since the crew of Magic Karpet had pressing business in Kingston, they opted for an early start. The rest of us decided to stay behind, enjoy the beauty of the Island, and make our start later in the morning. About an hour later, Magic Karpet radioed that because of the light air, they had been forced to start the iron jib. They were out. Pyewacket got away sometime before Simmac who left at about 1130. Alpine Star and Morning Mist both got away at about 1330. As it turned out the onshore breeze did not develop and the best winds of the day were those that blew around the noonhour. As a result, Simmac made the fastest spinnaker run, followed by Morning Mist and Alpine Star. Apres Ski turned right, instead of left and soon disappeared around the corner of Yorkshire Island. Having enjoyed the beat to windward the previous day, (I guess) they decided to repeat the experience on Day 2. At time of writing, it still has not been confirmed whether Morning Mist won Leg 2 on adjusted time. Therefore, the unconfirmed results of an overall excellent weekend are has follows:

Keep your fingers crossed!!!!!




NEW MEMBERS
