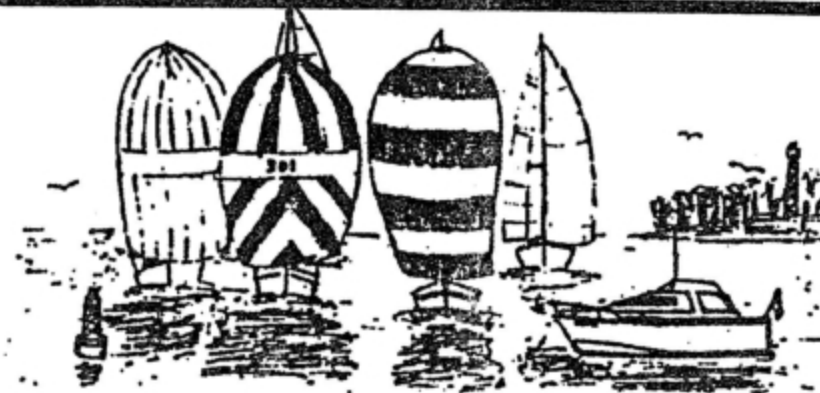

Cruising - Labour Day Cruise.

The Skippers meeting for the Labour Day Cruise was held in the clubhouse at 1900 hrs, Fri. Sept 1. The general plan was to go west, as most of the other cruises went east. Almitra, Alpine Star, Midnight Sun, Pyewacket, Sueno and Zoom cast off their moorings at 1000 hrs Sat and headed out. A light southeasterly zephyr made progress very slow as there was just enough wind to tease .. but Almitra is a lot of boat to tease, so we had to motor some. Eventually, as we neared Bath, the breeze freshened and came in from the Southwest which enabled us to close reach past the Upper Gap. By this time it was too late to get to Waupoos, so we opted to anchor at Prinyers Cove for the night.

The venue for happy hour was Almitra so most of the fleet rafted alongside her. We were joined by the skippers and mates of El Gatito and Scarlet Runner. Maxine had suggested wine and cheese, but all kinds of delicious foods were brought so one's appetite for dinner was basically spoiled.

The next morning brought a southwesterly breeze so, after consultation, a consensus was reached to drift back to Kerr Bay. We upped anchor about noon and, as luck would have it, picked up a nice quartering breeze which gave us an early arrival at Kerr Bay. The reduced fleet (Midnight Sun went home) joined Bruce And Alda aboard Pyewacket for our afternoon social.

During the night the wind shifted and came directly into the bay making the anchorage very rough. Alpine Star, Pyewacket and Sueno left early for home and Almitra and Zoom left Kerr Bay around noon.

All in all it was a quiet cruise as no one qualified for the lead lifering award and (as we learned later) Waupoos was rife with flies and other flying insects.
