

COMMODORE'S NOTES - OSA/CYA REPORT

On Monday, May 6, Al Will, Executive Director, Ontario Sailing Association, came to Collins Bay to tour our club and facilities. Al was given the history of our club and he readily saw how far we have managed to come during the few short years of our existence. He was impressed with the marina facility and our quiet, peaceful surroundings. The co-operation that exists between CBYC and Collins Bay Marina plays a major role in the success of our club and that in itself makes us unique. Later in the evening, at Kingston Yacht Club, Al met with a small, but enthusiastic group from Collins Bay Yacht Club, Kingston Power and Sail Squadron and the Eastern Ontario Marina Operators Association. The purpose of his visit was two-fold; the first, to explain the benefits of CYA/OSA membership and the second, to update us on the Joint Task Groups on Vessel Registration and Operator Licensing and the proposed legislation that could result.

CYA/OSA are the regulating bodies that set the standards for instructors, sailing instruction and training in this province. Membership is required to participate in the many racing events sponsored by various clubs in Ontario and the rest of Canada. As a club, we are able to avail ourselves of several benefits offered by CYA/OSA membership. These benefits range from hosting provincial, national and world championships to the many sail training programs that encourage our young sailors to compete and possibly represent Canada in the Olympics. To list all the benefits that we enjoy as CYA/OSA members would take far too much space in this publication, but this information can be found in the CYA/OSA publications found in the Clubhouse. Please read them.

During his presentation to our group at KYC, Mr. Will pointed out that CYA/OSA are enthusiastically involved in representing our interests with regards to the Joint Task Groups on Operator Licensing and Vessel Registration. They are opposed, as most of us seem to be, to hefty fees to implement any new program. They are aware of the boating public's perception that the government has recently realized its oversight of a huge source of revenue and now intend to collect from an already overtaxed boating public. It seems that Ontario's participation may be on hold due to a lack of federal government funding to implement any new proposals.

All opinions matter, so please fill out the insert found in the last issue of the Collins Mixer and they will be forwarded to those that lobby for us. A handwritten letter to your local MPP and MP requesting a reply will also help. Be sure to set out what your opinion is and ask for their stand on the issue.

After listening to Mr. Will, I came away satisfied that CYA/OSA are representing us and have our interests at heart. Any updates that we receive on the Joint Task Group or any proposed legislation will be brought to your attention in future issues of the Collins Mixer.




