SAFETY

Your Fleet Captain says:

"Practise Your Rescue Routine"

Power boaters and sailors should become familiar with various techniques for recovering a person overboard. Can you lift them in, if you were suddenly alone? In cases where a person's size, or the freeboard of the boat would make retrieval by hand difficult, boaters should consider appropriate lifting slings and adequate rigging. Consider how effectively the manoeuvres can be performed, regarding also sea-state and the condition of the person overboard. The Canadian Coast Guard strongly recommends each skipper work out a recovery technique and Practise, either parts or all of your routine.





NEWS FROM ROVINKIND II -PETER & TERRY

Rovinkind II arrived in Canada on Sunday, June 11. We landed at Lunenberg Yacht Club where a contingent of four custom officers eventually appeared. They asked a few questions and cleared us in. Since then we have been taking it easy among the Islands in Mahone bay.

After we left Port Kinsale, where we started the trip, we spent a week in the Annapolis area, getting the engine serviced (routine maintenance), stocking the larder, and spending money at West Marine! It was Graduation Week at the Naval Academy, so the town was full of Midshipmen and their families - almost as crowded as the boat show. A few days were spent in Whitehall Creek, where the Whitby 42 Rendezvous is held each year. Here we met Doug Stephenson and enjoyed dinner with him, talking about boats and boating. Leaving Whitehall Creek we headed to the top of the Chesapeake, and to the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal, which goes through to the Delaware River. We passed through the canal and anchored at Reedy Island, ready for an early departure. Reedy Island has a current running through the anchorage - always either flooding or ebbing. When the wind opposed the current it got uncomfortable and lumpy!

The next day was our first attempt at Delaware Bay. Winds were forecast as 25 knots NE, which should have been a reach down the river. However by the time we got half way down we were motor sailing into a stiff easterly, with reports of 3 m square waves at the mouth. We decided to turn back and went all the way in to Summit North Marina, in the middle of the C&D Canal. Here we spent a couple of days waiting for better weather. The next attempt was with calmer seas and lighter (almost no) winds - but Delaware Bay is never still, and with the currents and left over lumpy seas it was an arduous day. As a final souvenir the rolling and pitching shook up the fuel enough that a cup of water got into the fuel filter, and just as we got to the mouth of the Bay and were raising the Mainsail the alarm went off.

Our mast was too high for us to go through the Cape May Canal, so we skipped Cape May, at the mouth of the bay, in favour of heading offshore towards Cape Cod. Seas were very lumpy, and there was still no wind, so we motored non-stop for 50 hours, crossing the approaches to New York Harbour and going East of Long Island and into Buzzards Bay. We stopped at Onset Mass, just at the mouth of the Cape Cod Canal. Here we spent almost a week, recovering from the first leg, then waiting for Ron Hoffman, who joined us for the last leg of the trip, and finally waiting for a NE gale to pass. Eventually we headed through the Canal, but only went as far as Provincetown on Cape Cod, where we thought it prudent to wait overnight since the forecast was for offshore gale force winds moderating to moderate NW winds the next day. The NW winds arrived and we sailed about 25 miles towards Nova Scotia. Then they dropped to a flat calm and we were motoring again. And continued motoring for the next two days through glassy seas across the approaches to Boston Harbour, across the Gulf of Maine, around Cape Sable, until we reached the mouth of Mahone Bay! Sometime we'll get to SAIL this boat on a passage...

So, we're back in Canada, and looking forward to the next month around Mahone Bay, then to Halifax for the Tall Ships in July.
