As Lloyd states in the "Safety" article of the August edition the "A" flag of the international code of signals signifies "Diver down" and as far as I know it is still used for this purpose by the navies of the world. However the "A" flag is a blue and white burgee. For some reason the recreational diving community ignored this usage and devised their own flag, the one Lloyd describes. Although it purports to protect divers, in fact it has been applied so promiscuously as to be meaningless. It is permanently displayed on vehicles ashore, commercial establishments catering to divers and dive boats whether they are moored, anchored or under way, whether they are in operation or idle. We should, of course, honour its warning but I do resent having thrust upon me the responsibility of protecting those who diminish the significance of a safety signal by making casual and inappropriate use of it. I, myself, do not take the flag seriously unless it is displayed on a float in the water.





Did you know that... ...the Pigeon Island Race was the first event held by Collins Bay Yacht Club? The lure of this long distance race was so strong that the first Collins Bay Round the Pigeon Race attracted no less than 36 entrants. Held on September 12, 1980, the race committee devised a course around Pigeon Island plus umpteen navigation buoys to provide a course of 28 nautical miles as the crow flies. A SE wind of 15 knots blew for 6 hours resulting in an exhilarating race with 3-6 foot waves. All 36 boats were back by 1930 hours. The first to return were the two trimarans, Flyaway and Desiree in less than two hours. Bill & Mary Steenbakker provided an open air barbecue, corn roast and dance after the race. An evening rain did little to dampen spirits.

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


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We left Bayfield in the afternoon and continued on Lake Huron towards Tobermory. We were seeing a number of squalls on the radar and sailed right into a severe thunderstorm. We had switched all the electrics off as a precaution but there was a crash of lightening and a bulb in one of the cabin lights burst. When the storm was over we found that the GPS was not giving a correct track, a great lesson in not relying on electronic navigation! Luckily a hand held GPS verified that at least the latlong was correct on the ships GPS. That night fog rolled in and the winds became very fluky. Steering by the compass I was hit by a strong gust from a completely different direction and the main gybed and gybed back again. The instructor took the wheel and promptly gybed two times more. then suddenly we were in quiet air. I still don't know what it was. We were heading for Cove Island at the entrance to Georgian Bay. As we did not have the detail charts for Cape Hurd we decided to head north and come around Cove Island. We were on course for the lighthouse on the North of the island and while visibility was very restricted the chart indicated it was fitted with a horn .Suddenly no more than two hundred yards off the bow the top of the lighthouse emerged from the fog. We came about immediately and radiod the coastguard to say the horn was not functioning. "discontinued two years ago" they replied - a lesson to keep charts up to date!.

We arrived in Tobermory mid morning and sailed into dock with the chief instructor playing the bagpipes on the foredeck! Quite a show for the tourists! After lunch we sailed on to a beautiful little anchorage Wingfield Basin with a narrow entrance indicated by a range. There we practiced anchoring under sail .We then headed out to perform COB maneuvers in daylight and at night and returned to anchor at night. The next morning we set sail for our destination Midland and refuelled and pumped out.

That night we wrote the exam which took around two hours and covered a wide range of topics from theory of sailing to collision regs, weather ,boat maintenance and cruise planning.

After cleaning the boat the following morning tired but definitely more confident and certainly more competent we caught the bus for Toronto and home.
