Important Notice: Dredging is underway

We are proud to announce that after three years of planning and obtaining permits we are now in a position to start dredging on July 15.

The Purpose

To maintain our reputation as a first class marina, we are dredging B-dock and the channel leading into the marina to a depth of 10'+. We are also cleaning out the haul out slips. Our goal is to provide access to boats drafting as much as 8' even during low water years.

The Timing

Dredging will commence on July 15 and will run until the end of September. In order to achieve our goal within the necessary permit time lines, it is imperative that we maximize the use of daylight hours 7 days a week until the job is done.

The Method

There will be a barge holding an excavator offshore that will load trucks shuttled between the excavator and shore using two other barges operating on a cable ferry system.

Inconvenience vs. Benefits

Yes, there will be some inconvenience due to the nature of this important project. We ask for your understanding and cooperation, realizing that the long term benefits will far outweigh any short term inconvenience.

The Cost

The cost of this project \$300,000. Collins Bay Marina will pay the first \$200,000 while the remaining \$100,000 will be funded by the Federal Government's Emergency Dredging Assistance Program. This is our commitment to maintaining a first class facility.

There will be steel cables stretching between the excavator barge and shore. They will be just above or below the surface of the water.




FAMILY DAY AND SAIL PAST


