Bruce was a quiet man, but when asked to speak at CBYC functions he always did it with wit, skill and style. He delivered his stories in the same manner.


Bruce was foremost a gentleman, an admirable quality indeed. Bruce will be sadly missed but he left behind lots of fun and fond memories. See you later Bruce.





