Hub, Henry and Ian have started using the new Linkbelt crane. Our first launch was for a 42 foot Hallberg-Rassy owned by new Collins Bay Marina members Annik and Patrick. Weighing in at over 30,000 pounds, this vessel was a proper lift for this 65 ton crane. By this fall's haul out season, it should be well adjusted to its new life at the marina.



Ultra Low Sulphur Diesel Fuel

Since October 2006, all on road Diesel fuel sold in Ontario has

been Ultra Low Sulphur fuel, decreasing sulphur content from 500ppm contained in Low Sulphur Fuel to



15ppm. Our supplies are drawn from automotive sources so that the same conditions apply to the fuel sold at our marina. This reduction lowers the lubrication characteristics of the fuel. While the refiners state that no additives are required, we are told by some of our boaters with older engines that they have been advised to use additives to restore lubricity. (Note that next year will see the introduction of ethanol to automotive <u>gasoline</u> in Ontario. All affected boat owners should be reading up on the implications of this change.)

CBYC 's 2007 Cruisers Code

- #1: **Expect the unexpected** after all, Murphy was a sailor!
- #2: **CBYC cruises** are planned, informal events with the prime objective of having fun, sharing experiences, discovering new anchorages, learning from each other and honing sailing skills.
- #3: **Communication** the **volunteer** *Cruise Captain*(s) will provide information, well in advance of each cruise, including the itinerary, the dates and general logistics. All cruise information will be posted at 3 sites:
 - a) on the CBYC website in the Cruises section
 - b) the CBYC Mixer and
 - c) on the Club House Bulletin Board.

NOTE: All CBYC members (and members in waiting) will be given an opportunity to sign up before each Cruise. Arrangements (e.g. reserved dock spaces, food – details of what to bring, cost if applicable, etc.) will be made based on the boats signed up by the deadline indicated.

- #4: Cruise Captain (CC) each cruise will have a volunteer CC whose responsibility is to communicate with the participants about the logistics for each day and any changes to the plans. Again, expect the unexpected and see #6!! Participants are free to join or leave the cruise at any time please keep the CC informed of your status to avoid a Search & Rescue effort!
- #5: **Pleasure Seekers** cruises are as much fun as the participants make them sharing happy hours, pot luck meals, swapping stories and jokes. It is up to the participants to make the events a success! Ideas and volunteers are appreciated.
- #6: **Weather, SNAFU's and Other Challenges** participants need to be prepared for changes based on weather conditions such as hurricanes or snowstorms, SNAFU's such as crowded anchorages or running out of Champagne and challenges such as silent neighbours or worse, noisy neighbours. Common sense should prevail at all times! And, remember, the volunteer CC is not responsible for the weather!
- #7: **Expenses/Cancellations** cruise participants are responsible for their own expenses (e.g. docking, common expenses for each event). Cancellations made either by the participant or by the *CC* will depend on the arrangements made for that particular cruise.
- #8: **Complaints** want some cheese with that whine!! Seriously, if you have a beef, address it with the *Cruise Chair(s)*. If you have ideas on how it can be done better volunteer to do it next time. Recruits are always welcome.
