Airport Expansion

The revised Kingston Airport master plan was accepted by the EIT committee on September 19 and sent on to the full city council for adoption. It recommends eventual runway expansion to a maximum of 6000 feet with no change to the existing aircraft approaches. With this revision, the impact of long term airport growth on the marina, its operations and its ambiance is expected to be minimal. Sailing School Report

It is with mixed emotions that I submit this, my final report on the state of affairs for the Collins Bay sailing school, to the membership. I turn back to the membership a very vibrant and successful (both in Instruction and Financial) Sailing school, All members should be very proud of the tremendous efforts put forward by all involved.

The Sailing school has come and gone for the 2007 season. Partic ipation was excellent in all classes although this year started out very slowly and definitely caused us some nervousness (*right Sarah*?) as we had a very ambitious budget that had been presented and accepted by the executive earlier in the year. We also had additions to the staff and a commitment had been made to purchase a new Hunter 140 from Schooner Yacht Sales which was not delivered until the middle of July (very frustrating as Hunter have now moved to Florida). After realizing there were no sails and the rudder bracket was put on by an alien, we were able to carry on with Schooner Yachts help. Hull number 1 was sold to Andy at Ahoy rentals where I am sure the boat will continue to spend most of its life upside down. Because of the way the month of August fell, we included an extra week at the end of the month as a way to increase revenues. This was a gamble that paid off handsomely with 20 students registering for the session. All the staff, even though they were exhausted, rose to the occa-

sion and gave a first rate class to a very willing group of students. We held an adult course in June as an experiment that also was a success.

All classes throughout the summer were fully booked and this year we had NO refunds that we had to fulfill. Once again, under the watchful eye of Amy Guest, our head instructor, the school enjoyed The Dinghy regatta in the late tremendous success in regard to planned activities and relationships with the Marina and the house committee.

This year we continued with the position of a full time paid volunteer to complement our staff. This allowed us to offer a more concentrated effort on a planned and fun filled experience for all the students. We added an additional CYA certified Instructor, Jordan from paid helper to a certified CYA Green instructor. Many congrats. Nick Allinson came up very responsibly to be Head Instructor in training, garnering his CYA Blue level during the winter and looking after the Bronze program. Our paid volunteer was Jean Jamieson-Haynes. All the instructors, including the paid volunteers, fulfilled dual duty instructing the Adult course on Tuesday and Thursday Nights. The feedback from the adults was great and we even offered a Bronze program for adults this year during the month of August. Unfortunately, it could not be co-coordinated this year to have Bronze students out on

Thursday nights. This very worthwhile project should not be abandoned; they are the future and might buy your "Abbott". In past years, with the help of Bruce Anderson and Doc Johnson, we were able to include some Bronze sailors in the Thursday night racing program which proved very successful for all involved.

spring was a success and with recommendations should continue.

We purchased a new Hunter 140 this year that rounded out the fleet. The bonuses to our staff were contingent on a positive report from the Marina at the end of the school and I am very pleased to say I had great joy to write the cheques and give them to all the staff. Amy, Nick, Jordan and Lynsey, stand up and take a bow; you deserve it. Allen, and Lynsey Yates graduated Your professionalism and teaching skills are well beyond your years. You made my job a lot easier and a lot more fun.

> A full financial report was presented to the Executive in September and was accepted as presented. (a copy of which is being presented to the general membership) The highlights of the report were that we were able to exceed our budgeted revenues and meet our re-payment commitment to the CYA (in regard to the purchase of the Club 420's). This along with replacing an out-dated motor and purchasing a new boat, plus leaving an opening balance to start

next year in excess of \$14,000.00 was a credit to all involved.

My recommendations for next year of the Instructors to lead the day are to add flotation devices to the top of the masts (our muddy bottom is brutal when they turtle) and leave the fleet as status quo. The 140 is now discontinued from Hunter. The 146 is not suitable as a replacement for the whole fleet and therefore planning needs to start as to what type of boat will eventually replace the 140. The fleet is now the youngest it has ever been with 5 boats less than 3 years old. The coach boats are perfect for what we need them for and are in great shape. The motors are all new and we now have a very good spare (the mariner 9.9) that Hub has stored for us. There are 3 brand new suits of sails for the Hunters, plus spare rudder heads and breakable parts. So now is the time to potentially bank \$18K a year which would allow us to replace all the Hunters in four years for cash.

Our fleet suffered only minor repairs this year and I believe were well taken care of by the Instructors and students alike. All in all, I would declare the 2007 season a huge success and look forward to building on this for a successful school in 2008.

We did encounter some fairly significant damage prior to the start of school during the CBYC Fun Day Regatta. In the aftermath, it is my recommendation (and a resolution was passed at the July Executive meeting) that whenever the Dinghy's are used in a club sanctioned event, the club will pay one and be on the water for disaster recovery.

In 07 we held an Open House in May. We sent an invitation to students and parents and it was a huge success and should continue on for 08. We started in 06 and are proud of the hand-out we have developed to educate newcomers and returning students alike.

In March we attended the Sports and Leisure Show at POH. This must be continued and is a wonderful way to promote the school. We also ran the one week course at the end of August which was a success with 20 students.

One note that continues to amaze me is the communications when there is a perceived problem by our membership. To date, Sarah and myself have received zero complaints from the membership but many complaints have been lodged to the Marina. I feel the staff have been incredibly responsible and approachable (taking very seriously their individual responsibilities to the school, the marina and the club). It would be nice to know that the membership and the school were trying to strive toward a common goal. For the future, it would be nice to have the membership's input, either good or bad, and be receptive to dialogue as to why we may be doing some-

thing that looks wrong to you but makes sense if you have all the facts or maybe something we are doing indeed needs to be changed. For the 08 Season, the Staff are hired (contracts have been signed. and wages negotiated). The Fees have been posted and the dates set for the school.

It is with great sorrow that we Bid Adieu to Amy Guest, our Head instructor. For those of you fortunate enough to have met this dynamic young lady, she was the driving force behind the huge success that we have had with the school. Her motherly way to ensure her words were acted on and her passion for sailing kept bringing students back year after year for more. Amy, my undying thanks for a wonderful job "well done". Your shoes are going to be huge to fill. (Good Luck Nick I know you will do your best) We bid also farewell to Jean, good luck in all that you do, many thanks for a job well done. To note once again, all our staff are graduates of the school and are all enrolled in scholastic endeavors. maintaining our commitment to help students and their parents with their personal scholastic financial burdens. They all bring a fabulous level of enthusiasm and skill. (I know first hand that our school is second to none from all the schools around.) We should all be very proud of their commitment and team spirit. Good luck guys.

Take a moment and introduce yourself to our staff. They are all

CBYC Retains Cruiser Challenge Cup

The annual trek to Waupoos Marina is one of the highlights of the cruising calendar. A relaxing sail up are fast! The Brothers are in sight...note time... the North Channel, quietly slipping past the Rock, vineyards to starboard, Green Island to port, the diamond sparkle of Waupoos Island...Waupoos – where time stands still. Waupoos time. Happy hour. A leisurely jaunt to the "Duke". Ice Wine chocolates, a glass of cider, and hot tub. Good food, good friends, good times.

Yet beneath this idyllic setting, the tension builds. As the sun rises on another Labour Day Monday, crews are checking weather forecasts, wind strength and direction, sail selection. By 9am, boats are starting to circle just outside the Marina, setting sails, planning strategy, and building a full head of steam to pass between the Marina and Waupoos Island dock. Gusts up to 20 knots, right on the nose for the first leg – a tough slog so early in the morning. Ease off around the island, Green Island to port, start to pick-up speed....crap the cruising chute ripped. Crap again, the jib halvard jammed. Finally, out comes #1 and wing-on-wing, past the Rock, blast through the Gap and roar past Kerr Bay, dodging other "cruisers", ferries, and assorted obstructions.

With 20 boats competing in the 2nd annual Cruiser's Challenge Cup (10 from KYC and 10 from CBYC), this year's event once again showed there's a little racer in every cruiser! With KYC proposing the lowest average time to determine the winning club, CBYC countered with no restrictions on sails. When all times were collected, computed and verified, once again CBYC came out the winner, with an average time of 4:26:53, vs. KYC's time of 4:32:51.

Congratulations to the CBYC fleet of O'Naturel, Commotion, Moondance, Purrfection, Yer Out, Poco Loco, Dream Haze, Rus II, Ondine II, and Aslan! The Cruisers Challenge Cup will be presented to CBYC at the annual KYC Cruisers Banquet later this year. In the meantime, keep those cruising skills honed for next year as we defend the Cup once more!
