
The recognition by this publication is being welcomed by members of the Kingston city council as helping to put Kingston on the world stage.

The weed bloom in early June is following its normal cycle of abating later in



the month. We expect to receive our weed control permit in early July to address the remaining weeds in the marina. Note that the government prohibits any weed control until after the end of the spawning season, July 1.

Securing Boats

It is important for the safety of boaters walking past your vessel that no part of the boat (especially a sharp anchor) protrudes onto the main dock where it could cause injury. Please take the time to ensure that your vessel is securely tied and will not be a hazard, even with a wind shift.

From the Archives

29? Yes, Collins Bay Yacht Club is 29 years old!

During the planning for the 1st Round the Pigeon Race in September 1980, the idea of a yacht club in Collins Bay was developed.

Informal Thursday night races throughout the summer had been drawing an enthusiastic group of participants and a camaraderie had developed among the boaters at Collins Bay Marina. Through the efforts of Bob Wright (1st commodore), Gord Unsworth (Race planner) and Bill Steenbakkers (CBM), a very successful Pigeon Island Race, with 36 participating boats and a BBQ provided by the Steenbakkers on the lawn, was the launching pad for a yacht club in Collins Bay.

The 1st recorded meeting was held Sept. 1, 1980. A social evening held in February signed 45

members to the new club. The first newsletter was published in April 1981.

The Collins Bay Round the Pigeon Race, the Collins Bay Yacht Club Newsletter and our close association with Collins Bay Marina have been traditions from 1980 to the present.

Other than a chilly beginning the adult evenings have been great – usually steady learning wind that lets the students get a good feel for the boat.

An interesting hunter -only pintle/gudgeon set-up is the reasoning behind our summer long rudder-on policy; too many stainless parts have been bent leaving a costly repair bill. Lynsey and I have thoroughly tested the new 420, going with mutual agreement, as fast as we ever have in a dinghy.

Here's to another great summer at CBYC both on the water, in the class-room, and of course at the club functions, where you can find all of our instructors in attendance. Please don't be shy to say hello to our newest - CJ
