Commodore's Corner

I would like to begin my first installment of *Commodore's Corner* by thanking the outgoing Commodore and the outgoing Yacht Club Executive for their service over the past two years. During this period the club has seen great

progress. The club has increased its membership and continues on a sound financial footing. The racing activity has provided opportunities for those who have a competitive spirit and, for those who are more of a cruising orientation, opportunities for cruising adventures were organized. The sailing school has flourished with the addition of Can Sail 5 training and access to racing events. The very generous gift of a Tanzer 22 by the marina owners to the sailing school has enabled the establishment of an introduction to keel boat sailing course. And, let's not forget the various social events that have provided opportunities for more fun. On behalf of our entire club membership I convey our sincere thanks for a job well done and our sincere appreciation for the investment of time and effort that vou have made for our collective benefit. We are a better club as a result of your tenure.

We now have a new commodore and a new executive. What can you expect during the tenure of the new CBYC executive? Our first executive meeting will take place in January 2019 so at the time of the writing of this article we have not actually met. But from my point of view, I would like to focus initially on two themes:

consolidation and community.

We have seen several key initiatives during the tenure of the previous executive. I have mentioned the addition of Can Sail 5 to our sailing school. I have made reference to the keel boat familiarization course and, by the time the 2019 season begins, renovations to our clubhouse should be completed. It may be wise to take some time to review these initiatives to confirm that they are working as planned and to provide any fine tuning that may be necessary in order to ensure that maximum effectiveness is achieved. As with any new initiatives, it takes time for the existence of these programs to become well these activities. And I have known and it also takes some time to determine if the initial planning assumptions were valid. Therefore, we will take a close look at these new programs and adjust as necessary to ensure the long term viability and success of these initiatives.

The second theme I identified is community. Certainly one could accurately describe the CBYC and the Collins Bay Marina as a community. We are connected by our passion for sailing and boating, by our love of being on the water, and by the pleasure we derive from expanding and applying our

Some of us learned through courses. Some of us have learned by reading and watching videos. It is this approach that encourages a strong club and a strong sailing and boating community. This is a contribution that each of us can make throughout the season, especially to new members in our community. This is a current feature of the CBYC and one of which Lam particularly proud. I encourage all members of the club to continue in this approach and to continue to invest in our community in this way.

After the meeting came to an end, most of those in attendance gathered at the Loyal Oarsman for lunch and



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


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CBYC's 2019 Executive Committee

Who knew?! Our own Ruth Smith (Drifter) - our club's new Secretary - was part of the original C&C team from 1971 to around 1971 and worked there 1977. You can see her in the photo below (Ruth Coombes). C&C YACHTS, named for two of its founding partners, George Cuthbertson and George Cassian, was the largest-ever builder of sailboats in Canada.

Q: Ruth, when did you work for C&C?

A: I started working for C&C for about 6 years. Initially in Port Credit and the last two vears in Oakville. I was in my late twenties then.

Q: Why did C&C hire you?

A: I had taken an architecture

program at university. I really enjoyed the drafting portion of the program and did very well at it. Once I completed university, I worked in the Astronomy Department of the Toronto University as a drafter. It was while in Toronto that I

met my future husband, Maurice Smith, who was then the Captain of Toronto's Brigantine Pathfinder. One of his directors, Doug Hood, was a close friend of George Cuthbertson and he recommended me to Big George. C&C hired me for my drafting skills and I became a member of their design team.

Q: Describe for us what you did for C&C.

A: I did perspective drawings, line drawings, presentation sail plans with colour wash - all great fun to do!

(Here comes the technical jargon!)

Initially, I checked the offsets against the lines. Later, I developed the diagonal and "buttocks" from the water lines and sections. Each "set of lines", waterlines, diagonal lines and buttock lines and sections are all integrated and developed from the basic waterlines and sections. I also prepared rudder 'lines drawings'.

You have to remember that in those days there were no computer-aided design programs like AutoCAD to create precise 2-D and 3-D designs. In fact, the first-hand calculator with a 3rd root feature came out during my first year with C&C. I did my drawings using a 6H pencil on

mylar up to 1/32nd + or - (making it a 64th). I also did 'ink' lines to produce better prints. Good lighting and fine drafting skills were a must to successfully accomplish this.

I'd be given a sketch plan of a sailboat and asked to design its interior. I would have to fit everything in like a jigsaw puzzle, respecting the line drawing and making sure that nothing would end up sticking out through the hull (e.g. the head, the freezer). I really enjoyed that kind of work. I also did deck layouts.

Once the custom sailboats were built, we would do a sea trial to make sure everything was correct. I often would be aboard for the first race.

Q: Which sailboats contain your direct contribution?

A: That is hard to pinpoint. Certainly most of the custom-made boats after I joined the company. The first project I was assigned to was the 50' Phantom, built by Erich Bruckmann. I drew the interior perspectives for it. Only three were ever built and at least one of them is still on the water today with New Zealand's Phantom Yacht Charter.

I also designed the interior of a 66'. If my memory serves me

right, it was built for Paul J.
Phelan, the then owner of Cara.

Q: It must have been so exciting to be part of C&C in those days! Why did you leave?

A: I left because Maurice and I started our family. After our firstborn came along, I worked on a part-time basis for 6 months. During this time I designed some interiors and colour sail-plans. But then I retired to focus on raising our family on a full-time basis.

Thank you Ruth for having shared your experience with our readers!




Those still at CBM arranged a Saturday morning 8:15 am meeting

Let Us Enlighten You About LED Lighting!

Potential Interference of VHF-FM Radio and AIS Reception



Are the LED lamps on your boat a potential safety hazard? The US Coast Guard has received a number of reports from boaters regarding poor reception on VHF frequencies used for radiotelephone, digital selective calling (DSC) and automatic identification systems (AIS) when in the vicinity of light emitting diode (LED) lighting. The U.S. Coast Guard issued a *Marine Safety Alert* this topic on August 15, 2018.
